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Margaret Love practices law in Washington, D.C., specializing in executive clemency and restoration of rights, and sentencing and corrections policy. She has written and lectured widely on the collateral consequences of a criminal conviction, and is co-author of a forthcoming treatise *Collateral Consequences of Criminal Conviction: Law, Policy and Practice* (NACDL/West 2012).

Ms. Love chaired the drafting committee for the ABA Standards on Collateral Sanctions and Discretionary Disqualification of Convicted Persons, served as ABA liaison to the Uniform Law Commission's Collateral Consequences project, and now directs the NIJ-funded ABA collateral consequences compilation effort. She participated in drafting the ABA amicus brief in *Padilla v. Kentucky* and has written several articles on issues raised by the *Padilla* decision.
